The ladies also enjoyed celebrating Holi together – they see The Cup as home and the staff as family.



She is exceptionally intelligent and dreams of being a doctor. She is also highly vulnerable to being exploited. We've been building a relationship with her grandparents for the past 18 months and have finally been given permission to help Palak access a high quality English medium school.

The Nepali repatriation programme continues. We were devastated in December when Sangita, a lady we'd been working with for several months to go home to Nepal, became acutely unwell a week prior to her departure date and died the day before her new life would have begun. Frin made another trip to Kathmandu in January and has managed to engage more businesses to employ returning women. From that trip, we arranged for 4 staff members from Kathmandu Freedom Business, Purnaa, and the New Life Transition House to visit Kolkata at the end of March. They led workshops for women from Sonagacchi and Kidderpore, introducing them to life, work and home in Kathmandu. More importantly, relationships were formed that will reassure women in Kolkata that it is safe to return and that they will have trustworthy and known people to support them.

- For the Nepali women to be released from the things that are oppressing them so that they can be free to go home.
